Through the app you can log your **child's absences** and reason for the absence, so you don't need to send us a text message if you don't want to.


Junior Classroom Term 4

In the Junior class, students have been watching the lifecycle of a snow pea unfolding. In conjunction with the 2024 Prep students, they planted the seeds in pots and are measuring and recording the growth of each plant. Students are gradually increasing their vocabulary connected with growing plants, such as 'dormant' 'seed coat', 'germination' and learning how the plant is able to make energy for rapid growth.



The snow pea sends out little fine 'vines' as it grows. We put a stake in to help the plant climb and get lots of sunlight.

Our excursion to walk part of the Great South West Walk provided a stimulus for using descriptive language, as well as learning how verbs in writing show what someone is doing or feeling. After responding to the walk through an Art activity - using different types of cardboard packing - students then brainstormed captions for their pictures, using verbs as part of the caption. Dartmoor Primary School has contributed to an exhibition about the Great South West Walk at the Portland Library; the exhibition opens this Friday, 10 November 2023.









Responsible Pet Incursion with Barb and Tucker


On Wednesday the 1st of November we had a visit from Barb and her dog Tucker from Responsible Pets Victoria. Barb came and spoke to all of our students about what you need to be able to provide for a pet, including which pets are good for time poor people and which ones need lots of attention.

She taught us what to do if a dog appears to be angry and we all practised standing like a soldier or a statue, with our hands by our sides. We also learnt how to approach a dog on a lead and how to pat them. Remember to stand 3 big steps away, ask the owner if you can pat the dog, approach in an arc, let the dog smell your fist and then pat it along the back.

Tucker was very well behaved and let all of the students give him a pat on the back. It was fun to listen and learn from Barb and Tucker.

Our Class Novel

Students have been enjoying listening to the reading of 'Helen Keller' written by Margaret Davidson. Helen, born in 1880, was only eighteen months old when she became very sick and nearly died. When she recovered, Helen's mother discovered that Helen could no longer see or hear - she was completely blind and deaf! Students have all shown great interest in how Helen's teacher, Miss Annie, taught Helen how to communicate. Ask your children what Helen was like before Miss Annie arrived, and how Miss Annie managed to teach Helen!

Maths

We have moved from the topic of Multiplication on to Division - topics which are closely linked! All students have been completing many division word problems using a variety of strategies. For example, when dividing by 2, you can halve the amount, and when dividing by 4, you can halve and then halve again. Another strategy is counting in number sequences.

Literacy

We are continuing our explanation writing, with some students up to the publishing stage. We have also been learning about prefixes, suffixes, compound words, and the different ways to make nouns plural. Ask your children if they can explain some of these concepts to you!


2024 Foundation Visit - Monday 6 November
